FIRST DAY:	Review and Overview

1. Share something you gleaned about faith from last week's lesson or lecture.

2. God's grace is tremendously powerful! It is able to declare us righteous, reconcile us to grant us access to God, certify our hope, and even bring purpose to all our earthly afflice. The power of grace is greater than the power of sin. Sin has reigned since Adam, because all have sinned. However, God's grace has the power to forgive and set men free from sin. When sin brought death, God's grace brings life! It is in this amazing grace that believers star Romans 5 Paul declared the benefits and superiority of God's grace and explained how grace was made available to us through faith. As you read the passages below, note observations about God's grace:

SECOND DAY: Read Romans 5:1-5

Christ.

1. From Romans 5:1–3a list the benefits of *being justified by faith*: a. Verse 1 Connect this with Ephesians 2:14–15 and share your thoughts. b. Verse 2a Link this with Hebrews 4:16. What do you see? Comment on how someone can *stand* in this grace. c. Verse 2b (1) How do you see God's *glory* benefiting you? See also John 17:22. 2. In Romans 5:3a Paul declared that the believer could glory in tribulations because of what God produces through them. Use Romans 5:3b-4 to fill in the chart below with what God develops through our tribulations: Verse 3b produces Verse 4a produces Verse 4b produces a. What do you observe about God's purposes in affliction? b. How do these truths affect your perspective concerning *tribulations* in your life? c. Share a way God has brought purpose through *tribulation*. In Romans 5:5a Paul declared that hope does not disappoint. What evidence did he give for this? Romans 5:5b

What assurance does this give you concerning your *hope*? See also Ephesians 1:13–14.

THIRD DAY: Read Romans 5:6-11 1. According to Romans 5:6a, how did God show His love for us? a. Describe the state we were in before God intervened. See also Ephesians 2:1–3, 5. (1) Notice that He did this in due time. Connect this with Galatians 4:4 and share your thoughts. 2. In Romans 5:7–8 Paul used an argument style known as From the Lesser to the Greater. What is so much greater about what God did for us? a. How does this speak to you concerning God's love for you? 3. Romans 5:9 (NLT) states, And since we have been made right in God's sight by the blood of Christ, He will certainly save us from God's condemnation. How does this minister to you personally? 4. Read Romans 5:10 and answer the following questions: a. When were we reconciled to God? Romans 5:10a (1) Why is this remarkable? See also Colossians 1:21–22. b. Note and comment on what we gained: (1) Through Christ's death - Romans 5:10a (2) By His life - Romans 5:10b 5. Read Romans 5:11 (NLT), So now we can rejoice in our wonderful new relationship with God because our Lord Jesus Christ has made us friends of God. Why is this cause for rejoicing?

a. Share a practical way you rejoice in God's grace.

FOURTH DAY: Read Romans 5:12-17

- 1. Paul contrasted the original sin of Adam with forgiveness of sin through Christ. What happened *through one man*? Romans 5:12a
 - a. What further results occurred because of sin? Romans 5:12b
 - (1) Link this with James 1:14-15. What do you see?
- 2. In Romans 5:13 Paul explained that sin had not yet been identified nor defined before the giving of the law. However, sin was still at work and had devastating effects. According to Romans 5:14a, what were some of those effects?
 - a. Link this with Hebrews 2:14-15. What do you see?
- 3. In Romans 5:14 Paul stated that Adam was a *type of Him who was to come* in that he, like Christ, did not have a sin nature. With this in mind, use Romans 5:15–17 to contrast the results of Adam's sin with God's grace through Jesus Christ:

- b. How does the grace of God minister to you?

FIFTH DAY: Read Romans 5:18-21

1. Adam, as the first man created, is the father of *all men*; he therefore acted as a representative for *all men*. Jesus was sent by God to be the second representative of *all men*. Use the chart to note the different results that came from these two representatives:

- a. What stands out to you from the contrast between Adam and Jesus?
- 2. Romans 5:20a (NLT) says, *God's law was given so that all people could see how sinful they were.* Link this with Romans 7:7 to comment on the purpose of the *law*.
 - a. In spite of this, Paul had good news! Record this good news from Romans 5:20b.
 - (1) How does this truth minister to you?
- 3. Read Romans 5:21 (NLT), So just as sin ruled over all people and brought them to death, now God's wonderful grace rules instead, giving us right standing with God and resulting in eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord. Contrast the reign of sin with the reign of grace.
 - a. Link this with Colossians 1:12-14. What do you see?
- 4. Share a testimony of how God's grace has abounded in your life.
