FIRST DAY: Review and Overview

- 1. From last week's lesson or lecture, share a way you were prompted by the *mercies of God* to present yourself a *living sacrifice* for His use.
- 2. When your life has been fully given to God as a *living sacrifice*, your mind is also renewed and *transformed*. The result is a pattern of living that is distinct from the way non-believers live. As a *living sacrifice* to God, your priority is to live for God's purposes and to bless Him in all you do. This means that your priorities and objectives will reflect a life that is dedicated to God.

In Romans 12 Paul presented the priorities, pursuits, and objectives of a life fully given over to God. Read the sections below and list a few of these new pursuits:

- a. Romans 12:9–10
- b. Romans 12:11-13
- c. Romans 12:14–16
- d. Romans 12:17–21
- 3. As you begin your lesson, place your life back on the altar of God.

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. Romans 12:1

SECOND DAY: Read Romans 12:9-10

- 1. In Romans 12 Paul gave the believers practical exhortations to encourage their new lifestyle as a *living sacrifice*. Use Romans 12:9 to fill in the blanks with these exhortations:
 - a. Let ______ be without ______.
 - (1) The phrase *without hypocrisy* means *sincere*. Why is it important that *love be without hypocrisy*?

b. ______ *what is* ______.

(1) *Abhor* means to have horror of, to utterly detest. Why is it essential to regard evil in this way?

c. ______ to what is ______.

- (1) *Cling* means to cement, to join oneself to. Comment on what believers are to cling to.
- 2. Use Romans 12:10a to describe in your own words the kind of relationships we should have with other believers.
- 3. From Romans 12:10b comment on how we are to *honor* one another.
 - a. The NLT says we are to *take delight in honoring each other*. Why is this noteworthy?
- 4. From your study today, how do Paul's exhortations challenge you in terms of:
 - a. Your relationship with God
 - b. Your relationships with others

THIRD DAY: Read Romans 12:11-13

1. In Romans 12:11–13 Paul continued his exhortations to the believers concerning their walk with the Lord. Use these verses to list each exhortation and give an example of how this is practiced:

FOURTH DAY: Read Romans 12:14-16

- 1. According to Romans 12:14, how are we to treat those who *persecute* us?
 - a. Link this with Jesus' words in Matthew 5:44-46. What do you see?
- 2. From Romans 12:15 record how we are to care for one another.
 - a. Connect this with 1 Corinthians 12:25–26 and share your thoughts.
- 3. Romans 12:16a exhorts us to *be of the same mind toward one another*. Use the following Scriptures to comment further on what this looks like:
 - a. 1 Corinthians 1:10
 - b. Philippians 2:2–3
 - (1) Why do you think this type of living is so challenging?
- 4. Romans 12:16b (NLT) says, *Don't be too proud to enjoy the company of ordinary people. And don't think you know it all!* How does this type of attitude promote unity among believers?
- 5. How does our attitude toward believers and non-believers reflect our status as a *living sacrifice* to God?

FIFTH DAY: Read Romans 12:17-21

- 1. Romans 12:17a (NLT) says, *Never pay back evil with more evil*. Why is this an important guideline for believers? See also 1 Peter 3:8–9.
 - a. Rather than returning evil for evil, what are believers to do? Romans 12:17b
- 2. Use Romans 12:18 to describe how we are to endeavor to *live*.
 - a. Paul used the phrase, *If it is possible, as much as depends on you*. Why is this phrase essential to remember?
- 3. According to Romans 12:19, why are we not to *avenge* ourselves?
 - a. Romans 12:19 in the NLT reads, *Dear friends, never take revenge. Leave that to the righteous anger of God.* Why should believers leave all vengeance to God?
 - b. Connect Romans 12:19b with Psalm 37:8–9 and share your thoughts.
- 4. Rather than seeking vengeance, how are believers to treat their enemies? Romans 12:20
 - a. Link this with Luke 6:35. What do you see?
- 5. Record Paul's final statement concerning these things in Romans 12:21.
 - a. Share a testimony of overcoming *evil with good*.

b. Fellowship

c. Humility

d. Enemies
