Joshua 5

FIRST DAY: Introduction

Our God is a generously blessing God! He has a storehouse of goodness He wants to pour out on us. *No good thing will He withhold from those who walk uprightly* (Psalm 84:11). Yet, we often don't receive these blessings because we are not in the place physically and/or spiritually for God to bless us. However, because God is committed to blessing us, He will work in our lives by different measures to purify and move us to the place where He can bless us.

God was ready to give the children of Israel the Promised Land. However, the children of Israel were not yet in a place to receive the Promised Land. They needed to first be purified so they could begin to move in and possess the promises of God.

In Joshua 5, we will study Israel's spiritual preparation so that we might allow God to prepare us to inherit the promises He has stored up for us.

Ask the Lord to work in your heart a willingness to let Him purify and place you where He desires.
