Letters to Lead By

FIRST DAY: Introduction

Too often we, as believers, become preoccupied and distracted by all the evil that is going on in the world today. Jesus said, *It is impossible that no offenses should come* (Luke 17:1a). Unfortunately, evil and evil events are part and parcel of the climate of the fallen world in which we live. So, how are we as believers to live in an atmosphere permeated with apostasy, deception, hypocrisy, and lies? We do this by heeding the specific instructions Paul gave to Timothy in the fourth chapter of his first epistle. Paul instructed Timothy on what pitfalls to avoid and what activities and attitudes to pursue.

These evil times, in which we find ourselves living, are not a time to hide from the world, but to endeavor to:

- be filled with the Spirit
- walk in obedience
- be an example

Paul's instructions to Timothy, written over two millennia ago, still bear just as much relevance today. God desires to use each of us in these dark times to *shine as lights in the world* (Philippians 2:15). First Timothy 4 will give us instructions on how to shine even brighter!

Ask God to help you shine in this dark world.

SECOND DAY: Read 1 Timothy 4:1-3

- 1. Paul had previously warned the Ephesian believers about false teachers when he was with them (Acts 20:29–31). Paul reiterated these warnings to Timothy because he was the pastor of the Ephesian church. According to 1 Timothy 4:1a, what did the Holy Spirit *expressly* say?
 - a. The Greek word for *depart* is a forceful word signifying that these false teachers absolutely abandoned or fell away from the faith. Link this with Matthew 24:11–12 and 2 Thessalonians 2:3a. What do you see?

b. What is at the source of their delusion? 1 Timothy 4:1b

(1) Link this with Ephesians 6:12 and suggest an effective way to pray.

- 2. Paul then described the actions of these false teachers. Use 1 Timothy 4:2–3a to record and remark on:
 - a. The way these people speak (verse 2a)

(2)	Use John	8:44	to	comment	on	the	source	of	such
	speech.								

b. Their conscience (verse 2b)

(1) The Greek word for *seared* is *kausteriazo*, which means *to cauterize*, *to render insensitive*. Why do you think a *seared* conscience is dangerous?


c. Their restrictions (verse 3a)

- (1) These restrictions were an attempt by the false teachers to appear spiritual. How do Colossians 2:23 and Hebrews 13:9 clarify Paul's point?
- (2) Share a way in which you see the relevance of Paul's warning today.

- 3. In contrast to what the false teachers advocated, what did Paul advocate as the perspective on marriage and food by those who believe and know the truth? 1 Timothy 4:3b
- 4. Using what you have studied today, give some practical suggestions on how to discern between truth and deceiving spirits.

THIRD DAY: Read 1 Timothy 4:4-5

- 1. Those who believe and know the truth are to approach marriage and food with a spiritual perspective. Use 1 Timothy 4:4a to elaborate on this perspective.
 - a. How does Genesis 1:31 confirm this truth?
 - b. How are these things to be received?
 - (1) Link this with Colossians 3:17 and 1 Thessalonians 5:18 and share your thoughts.



4. Observe in your study today that Paul appealed to God's Word when addressing false teachers and their doctrine. Why is this a good practice?


FOURTH DAY: Read 1 Timothy 4:6-11

- In light of the dangers of these false teachers, Paul further instructed Timothy in his ministry. According to 1 Timothy 4:6a, what would make Timothy a good minister of Jesus Christ?
 - a. In Greek, the word for *instruct* suggests supplying for others from one's own resources. What does this convey to you about a minister's task?

Doctrine is the Greek word didaskalia, which means teaching. It refers to the essential teachings of God's Word.






The Greek word for exercise refers to intense and rigorous athletic training.

 - a. Why is it critical for you to know and practice these things?


FIFTH DAY: Read 1 Timothy 4:12-16

- 1. Although Timothy was a young man, Paul exhorted him to command and teach these truths to the Ephesian believers, not letting anyone *despise* or think less of him because of his *youth*. Rather, Timothy was exhorted to *be an example to the believers* (1 Timothy 4:12a). What does this convey about the significance of a believer's lifestyle?
- 2. From 1 Timothy 4:12b, fill in the chart to understand Paul's exhortation.
