

Power Through Prayer

1 Kings 18:41-46

⁴¹ Then Elijah said to Ahab, “Go up, eat and drink; for there is the sound of abundance of rain.” ⁴² So Ahab went up to eat and drink. And Elijah went up to the top of Carmel; then he bowed down on the ground, and put his face between his knees, ⁴³ and said to his servant, “Go up now, look toward the sea.”

So he went up and looked, and said, “There is nothing.” And seven times he said, “Go again.”

⁴⁴ Then it came to pass the seventh time, that he said, “There is a cloud, as small as a man’s hand, rising out of the sea!” So he said, “Go up, say to Ahab, ‘Prepare your chariot, and go down before the rain stops you.’”

⁴⁵ Now it happened in the meantime that the sky became black with clouds and wind, and there was a heavy rain. So Ahab rode away and went to Jezreel. ⁴⁶ Then the hand of the LORD came upon Elijah; and he girded up his loins and ran ahead of Ahab to the entrance of Jezreel.

Read 1 Kings 18:41–46

In the epistle of James, we read that Elijah the prophet had a nature like ours:

Elijah was a man with a nature like ours, and he prayed earnestly that it would not rain; and it did not rain on the land for three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth produced its fruit (James 5:17–18).

Like us, Elijah was subject to the same doubts, fears, and frailties that we face. The distinguishing feature of Elijah was not his great faith, his boldness, or courage (though he exercised faith, boldness, and courage). The distinguishing characteristic of Elijah was that he prayed earnestly. God not only heard Elijah’s prayer, He also answered the prophet’s prayers in spectacular ways. Elijah was in constant communication with God,

and it was through prayer that Elijah's faith was strengthened, his spirit emboldened, and his courageousness fixed.

Sometimes we are discouraged because we feel as if we lack faith, boldness, and courage. We should take heart knowing that the prophet Elijah struggled with the same factors. The distinguishing characteristic of Elijah's life—prayer—is accessible to us today. When we pray, our faith is strengthened, our spirits are emboldened, and we not only receive courage, but God works in and through our lives. Do you want to see God work in your life, circumstances, neighborhood, city, state, nation, and the world? Then pray!

Prayerfully read through 1 Kings 18:41–46.
